超基礎問題---2[2009年大学人試問題より](制限時間 30分)

次の英文を読み、下記の設問(A)~(C)に答えなさい。

First, I'll give you some idea of what kind of dentist I have. The last time I went to him, he had to remove the old work another dentist had done to reach some decay under it.

"Boy," he said enthusiastically, as he continued working, "you've had some very good dental work done in the past. (あ)Whoever did this did a nice job."

How many professional people do you know, in any field, who compliment the work done by anyone else?

It had been at least five years since I'd been to see my dentist. I'm one of those who doesn't go until it hurts, at which point, of course, it's too late. Many years ago, I'd had a tooth removed toward the back on the left side. A bridge* had been fixed to the teeth on either side of the hole, and it was so strong and comfortable that I'd forgotten I ever lost the original tooth.

On my first trip my dentist took X-rays.

"You may have to have a treatment in the root of the tooth," he said as he looked at the pictures.

I shrank.

He got out his drill, stretched my mouth out of shape, and started to (*w*)<u>clean out the bad</u> <u>stuff</u>. Finally he stopped, inspected the hole he'd dug, and said, "You may be lucky. It didn't go down as far as I thought."

He put a temporary filling in the holes, and (5)<u>sent me off</u> with a numb mouth and a warning not to bite myself while the novocaine** was still working.

Toward the end of the second visit, (\grave{z}) <u>he was in my mouth</u> with his drill when he said casually, "How are you going to pay for this?"

He has a simple, open way about him, and obviously this is standard practice for him. He doesn't just send you a bill when he's finished; he talks to you about it. They must have classes that address this problem in medical and dental schools now.

No matter how they (a)<u>do it</u>, I always feel a little uneasy when a doctor mentions money. I have such great respect for anyone in the medical profession that I think of them as being more concerned with my health than their fee.

"My company has a dental insurance plan," I said, trying to speak clearly with the vacuum tube in my mouth. "Do I pay you or do they?"

"<u>Why don't you give me a check?</u>" said the dentist. "Then, the insurance company will pay you."

On the third visit, I brought him a check for \$1,000, which he estimated would be about half the bill. I forgot to bring the insurance form for him to fill out.

During the periods when Ms hands or his machinery weren't in my mouth, I talked to him about dentistry and money. I don't think he's getting rich.

"The money's in things like this bridge I'm making for you," he said. "I see a lot of patients who only have their teeth cleaned. ((*)<u>There's no money in that</u>."

On my fourth visit, 1 brought the insurance form. He said he'd fill it out and mail it. The total bill was \$1,972.

Because of Christmas and the time it took the laboratory to make the new bridge, I didn't have another appointment to see him for ten days.

On about the sixth day, I came home, and much to my surprise and pleasure, found a check from the insurance company. 1 hadn't even paid him for everything yet, and I was getting some money back from my dental plan. The bad news was that they were only giving me \$945 of my \$1,972 bill. I must pay the remaining \$1,027.

It's difficult to put anyone's income in perspective in relation to our own. This skilled professional saw me six times and did a good, important job for me. I do have the feeling, though, that it must be easier for a doctor or a dentist to (き)<u>charge double</u> when he knows that someone other than the patient is going to pay half the bill.

Medical insurance has probably done more for doctors than for patients. I'm not complaining, just stating <u>a fact</u>.
